## A blessed and glorious Easter to everyone.

What a time, place and circumstances to be celebrating Easter! Yet here we are God's people in the midst of all this, let us resolve to show everyone that there is a better way, that God is real and that He has a plan for their lives. Let's resolve even more to draw close to Him, to pray for the needs of the world around us, to celebrate all that is good and to face down all that is evil.

Graham has provided his message from last Sunday which was sent out on WhatsApp, this is enclosed.

The readings for this Sunday are: Acts 10:34-43 and Matthew 28:1-10

#### Acts 10: 34-43

Then Peter began to speak: "I now realize how true it is that God does not show favoritism but accepts from every nation the one who fears him and does what is right. You know the message God sent to the people of Israel, announcing the good news of peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all. You know what has happened throughout the province of Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached— how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power, and how he went around doing good and healing all who were under the power of the devil, because God was with him.

"We are witnesses of everything he did in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They killed him by hanging him on a cross, but God raised him from the dead on the third day and caused him to be seen. He was not seen by all the people, but by witnesses whom God had

already chosen—by us who ate) and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one whom God appointed as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

#### Matthew 28:1-10

After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary



went to look at the tomb. There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men. The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen

from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshiped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

### Easter Sunday - the Greatest Day in History?

At the cross, man did his worst, and marvelled at the passive reaction of God the Son, and God in heaven. Yet the crucifixion of Jesus was the most significant and meaningful day in world history - because it dealt with the insoluble problems of the world, atoning for our sin in a single day, opening up for every human being the possibility of forgiveness, reconciliation with God and transformation and eternal life. But Easter Sunday not only revealed that all this was true and effective, but as God showed his greatest power and men and women struggled to turn from fear to joy, the new creation began with God's firstborn from the dead, and a whole new order was initiated - truly the greatest day in history!

   Omega, all time belongs to him, and all ages; to him be glory and
   power, through every age and for ever. Amen.

## The Power of the Cross - an encouragement from Pukka

Easter weekend for us brings back many memories of 14 years go. Pam was pregnant with twins,



and had gone to hospital for a routine scan. While she was at the hospital she was told she could return home, but that she had to return later the same day as there seemed to be complications with the pregnancy.

The following day we were proud parents of two beautiful girls, born 2 months premature. However, Bethany, the younger of the twins was rushed as an emergency to Birmingham Children's Hospital, while Jessica stayed at New Cross neonatal.

Bethany was in a very serious condition, this required an operation the same night, this was Good Friday 2006. During the operation Bethany suffered a cardiac arrest, then a short while later, miraculously, the medics were able to get her heart working again. By now, 3 hours were still needed to complete the rest of the procedure, however the odds on a positive outcome had now dropped from 50% to just 20%. That night while Pam and the rest of the family prayed in Wolverhampton, I went to the chapel at Birmingham Children's Hospital. That Good Friday night I knelt at the big wooden cross which hung in the chapel and thanked God for what He did 2000

years ago, also knowing that He could do something special for Bethany. As I cried and poured out my heart to the Lord, I could feel the power of the cross and its meaning.

Three hours later as the consultant brought our little baby girl out of the operating theatre, his words were that she had made it despite the odds! Both twins are now thriving - Glory be to God. We thank God that Jesus Christ is the same yesterday (2000 years ago), today (2020) and forever. Bethany's story appeared in the newspapers and can still be found on the internet. Bethany is a little miracle.

In this terrible time the stories of what God did 2000 years ago and 14 years ago give the world hope.

#### Virtual or Socially Distant Meetings

St Mary's have been broadcasting services using an 'app' called Zoom. This was used on Maundy Thursday. The 'app' allows multiple people to access a 'meeting' from the comfort of their own homes using their computer, tablet or smart phone, see details below of how it works. It is also possible to hear (but not see) and join in the church service using your landline or mobile telephone, again see details below.



#### Zoom instructions:

- 1. You will be prompted to download the Zoom 'app' the first time you click to join a meeting. This is straightforward and free.
- 2. To join a "live" meeting you will need to click on the link sent for the meeting. It will look something like this:

- 3. You may then be asked for a meeting ID which will also be sent to you.
- 4. You may be asked for a password; this will also be sent to you.
- 5. If you don't have a camera or microphone on your computer, tablet or phone you can still "see and hear" the service...it's just that they won't be able to see or hear you. If you do have a camera or microphone you can click on the sound /video icon at bottom left to turn them on or off at any point. The organiser of the meeting is able to 'mute' everyone when certain people are speaking.

#### Telephone instructions:

- 1. Ensure you have the 9-digit meeting number available, this should have been sent to you.
- 2. At the appointed time for the service, ring one of these numbers from your mobile phone or landline: 0131 460 1196 0203 481 5240 0208 080 6591
- 3. You will be asked to enter the 9-digit meeting number followed by the hash (#) key. This number will be sent to you.
- 4. You will now be asked to enter your participant number followed by hash but if you just press # it will work!
- 5. You will now be told that you have accessed the meeting, and how many other participants there are at that point; after this you will be connected immediately and be able to speak to the others and hear what they say. The organiser of the meeting is able to 'mute' everyone when certain people are speaking.
- 6. When the service ends, just put down your receiver.
